Course Description:

This course examines **infrastructure and housing issues** related to **sustainable urban development in less developed countries (LDC)**. Development is defined as a process which center in goals related to collective human wellbeing. Achieving such development goals depends on the ethics of development and its resulting investment priorities. Sustainable urban development takes places as a result of a balanced investment in constructed, natural, human and social capital in urban settlements aimed at achieving development goals. Infrastructure and housing issues are examined within the context of sustainable urban development and the role they play in achieving collective wellbeing.

The course is designed to provide students with an understanding of planning and urban development processes, including the forces and actors behind such processes. Case studies will be introduced to illustrate discussions. Students will have the opportunity to apply the knowledge learned in class by designing basic strategies for planning and evaluation of infrastructure and housing issues related to sustainable urban development in LDC.

Objectives:

Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to understand and participate more effectively in public policy and the decision-making processes related to infrastructure and housing issues in LDC. Students will also acquire basic skills to access and manipulate related information.

Grading Policies:

- One short analytical writing assignment identifying one critical problem 30% (5-7 pages and Power Point presentations).
- One problem solving statement (5-7 pages and Power Point presentations) 30%.
- Final report with policy recommendations regarding one specific problem or a combination of problems within one dimension of sustainable urban development related to infrastructure and housing issues (10-15 pages and Power Point presentations) 40%.

Note: Use the “insert text” option in Power Point to include the text with your speech for each slide in all presentations. Assignments will benefit from the use of maps, pictures and other types of graphic representations, including animated presentations.
